November is a month of reflection in many ways. Progress reports will go home on November 13th. Parent-Teacher Interviews will take place Thursday November 14th from 3:30 to 7:30 and Friday November 15th from 8:30 to 11:30. Friday November 15th is a P.A. Day and there is no school for students. Interview Requests Forms went home with students recently. Thank you for returning them promptly to your child's homeroom teacher. Interviews are scheduled on a "first come, first served" basis. Homeroom teachers will confirm Interview time with parents. Some classes may have Student Led Conferences. A school goal focusses on feedback and assessment and the student's ability to identify strengths and determine individual goals and "next best steps." Students should be able to share with families why they have received the grades present on the Progress Report. Our belief is that "together we are better" and we certainly see evidence of this each and every day as families and staff work together in the best interest of our students. We look forward to seeing families out to our Remembrance Day Assembly on Monday November 11th from 10:30-11:30. Our November Character Trait is Courage. Students are involved in reflection and learning about the efforts and heroism; past and present that many have displayed in the unified goal for Peace. Math and Literacy continue to be a focus at Fairport Beach. Teaching Staff use Research Based Diagnostics to determine a child's level and implement a variety of strategies, including Guided Practice which presents the opportunity for teachers to work with small groups and individual students to increase student success in various areas of Mathematics as well as in Reading and Writing. Ask your child what strategies they use to help them read and make connections and what strategies they use to help them problem solve in math. Wellness will always support learning as we focus on the importance of teaching the "whole child." Voice and identity engage students in their learning. Our staff and students continue to be engaged within and outside the classroom with many extracurricular opportunities available to students. We are so fortunate at Fairport Beach to have such a dynamic team of educators offering our students such a rich and diverse school learning experience. Thank you to families for your ongoing involvement and support.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your positive focus on attendance and punctuality. Being to school on time allows your child to receive important instructions at the start of the day and prepare themselves for the day ahead with their peers.

Snow is a lot of fun but it stays on the ground! No throwing snowballs. Thank you for reinforcing this with your child.






Children's Author; Alexis Alexander visited Fairport Beach this month and presented to Students in Kindergarten to Grade 4.





THE GREAT PUMPKIN CHALLENGE!

Treaties Recognition Week November 5-11

Ontario has designated the first week of November as **Treaties Recognition Week** to promote education. Treaties Recognition Week was introduced to honour the importance of Treaties and to help Ontarians learn more about Treaty rights and Treaty relationships. Treaties Recognition Week provides an opportunity for educators to continue planning curriculum-linked learning activities about Treaties and will help build awareness and a greater understanding of why we acknowledge the land/territory we are on.

November 11, Remembrance Day

On Remembrance Day we honour all who served and continue to serve our country during times of war. conflict and peace. Every year, at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, people who live in Canada as well as many other Commonwealth countries will stop what they are doing to observe a moment of silence to pay tribute to the sacrifices that were made and are still being made on our behalf. Over 6000 First Nations soldiers fought alongside the Canadian Forces throughout the First and Second World Wars. However, those who returned from the war quickly realized that the freedom that they fought for did not equally apply to them. This then, may also be a time to look both into the past and forward toward a better future for Canada's Indigenous People.

November 16, International Day of Tolerance

The United Nations has defined tolerance as respect, acceptance and appreciation of the endless richness of our world's cultures, our forms of expression and ways of being human (Declaration of Principles on Tolerance, 1995). The International Day of Tolerance encourages people to learn about, respect and recognize the rights and beliefs of others. It is also a time to reflect on the impact of intolerance and how various forms of injustice, oppression, racism and other forms of discrimination have a negative impact on society.



November 16, Louis Riel Day

Louis Riel was a Métis man who is also called the 'Father of Manitoba'. He was a heroic and influential teacher and leader who took on the challenge of ensuring that the Métis people could preserve their heritage and identity. To do this, Riel headed a Provisional Government which negotiated the Manitoba Act and provided some protection for the French language. He was a man of strength and courage, but he was not seen as a hero by everyone. Riel was labelled as a traitor for taking a stand and defending Metis rights and was consequently executed by the Canadian government.

Louis Riel Day is held every year across the homeland on November 16, the anniversary of Riel's execution in 1885. While Louis Riel Day marks one of the great tragedies of Canadian history, its recognition demonstrates their continuing resilience and determination to regain their rights and preserve their way-of-life in Ontario and across the Homeland. To commemorate Louis Riel Day, MNO citizens and communities hold events across the province to recognize the many contributions of the Métis to Canada, to celebrate Métis culture and to highlight the struggles that Métis continue to face.

November 19-23 Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week

Bullying is defined as a form of repeated, persistent and aggressive behaviour directed at an individual or individuals that is intended to cause fear and distress and/or harm to another person's body, feelings, self-esteem or reputation. Bullying occurs in a context where there is a real or perceived power imbalance (Ontario Ministry of Education). Looking at your School Climate Data and planning next steps is a part of how schools can work proactively in response to how students are feeling.

November 20, Transgender Day of Remembrance

Transgender Day of Remembrance is held in November to honour Rita Hester who was killed for being who she was. This day urges us all to raise awareness of the threat of violence faced by people who identify as transgender and the persistence of the prejudice felt by the transgender community.

November 25, International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women

Violence against women is still a devastating human rights violation present in today's world. For far too long, impunity silence and stigma have allowed violence against women to escalate to pandemic proportions—one in three women worldwide experience gender-based violence.

While gender-based violence can happen to anyone, anywhere, some women and girls are particularly vulnerable - for instance, young girls and older women, women who identify as lesbian, bisexual, transgender or intersex, migrants and refugees, indigenous women and ethnic minorities, or women and girls living with HIV and disabilities, and those living through

Violence against women continues to be an obstacle to achieving equality, development, peace as well as to the fulfillment of women and girls' human rights. All in all, the promise of the <u>Sustainable Development Goals</u> (SDGs) - to leave no one behind - cannot be fulfilled without putting an end to violence against women and girls.
